

The Gift of Christmas Unwrapped

Our services are childrenfriendly, with a **Sunday School** for very young children and their carers, which starts after the first 20 minutes of the service.

Coffee and Tea are served after each Sunday service in the downstairs rooms. Please do join us.

If you wish to discuss a wedding or christening, please see one of the authorized persons at the front desk after a Sunday service.

If you run out of wrapping paper this Christmas, you can take some birthday wrapping paper and simply add 'Jesus' after Happy Birthday! Up until the end of the nineteenth century, brown paper was generally used for wrapping Christmas presents. Then in 1917 Joyce Hall, who ran a stationery store in Kansas, ran out of brown paper at Christmas. In desperation, she sold French envelope lining paper instead, and the rest is history! The true gift of Christmas is Jesus, God's Son born in human form. But how did God gift wrap him? The wrapping he chose tells us a lot about the gift inside.

Wrapped in humanity: Christmas reminds us that God came to dwell with us in human form as a baby. For Jesus, 'who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness.' (Philippians 2:6-7).

Jesus was humanly gift wrapped, because God wanted to enter fully into our world, to reveal the immensity of his love for us and that we could know the eternal God personally. You have to be divinely human and earthy present to do that! This was no ordinary gift wrap because he was no ordinary baby.

Wrapped in poverty: Jesus' birth graphically illustrates how he was born in poverty. The stable or cave with its animals, smells and straw was not easy! 'For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich.' (2 Corinthians 8:9).

The poverty in which Jesus was wrapped is significant. The swaddling cloths could have been strips of cast-off clothing, or they may have been taken from linen that was carried on long journeys by travellers in case of death. This powerfully reminds us that Jesus was born to die, wrapping himself with our own sinfulness. This was not the gift wrap of a king, yet only the King of kings allowed himself to be gift wrapped in this way! Through his poverty we are rich, as he offers us forgiveness and a new relationship with God. The envelope with French lining carries this great Christmas message. The plain exterior looks similar to any other (the humanity of God), yet the inside dazzles with colour and beauty, reflecting the glory of God himself!

You never know what is round the next corner! One minute you are clearing up leaves from the lawn and shredding them for the compost bin then the next minute you are having a ride in van with a blue flashing light and chatting to a friendly ambulance man!

It happened very unexpectedly and was not in my plan for the day. On arriving at A&E I was sent for a CT scan, told I had had a stroke and despatched to the ward in BRI. Doreen had joined me by then and while being very compos mentis I was also a little concerned. A look around the ward quickly made me realize that I was also very lucky! Everyone except one was a lot worse than I.

There are a lot of caring people in this world and quite a few of them were in ward 9 of BRI. I only spent four days there but found that all, from the cleaner who arrived at 6:00 a.m. each day to the consultant who came to have chat, not to mention the many nurses were cheerful, attentative and working hard to get you well again, and they were still there at 7:00 pm too. I found it hard work to find a complaint. (But did find one :- no radio 3! I will settle for nothing more than that!)

I received a wealth of good wishes from friends and relatives, church members, camera club, bell ringers, Saltaire stories and Maria and her tour team. A big thank you to everyone. It helps a great deal when you are rather down and is very supportive.

One knock on affect is that the bells fell silent. With hospital business distracting at least three of the ringers, there were not enough. We could do with some more, a bit younger, ringers. It is great fun and not too time consuming. Commitment is ringing prior to a service and practice on Monday evening at 7:00pm. You are welcome to come to service of course but it is not a commitment. We are one of only four non conformist churches with a ring of bells. It would be great pity if they fell silent on a long term. We hope to start ringing again now and I hope to start ringing again by Christmas.

Meanwhile a big thank-you for all the support and cards that I received from the Church.

Building Community - Update on Church Restoration

On Sunday 2nd November Dorothy and Geoff Mawson cut the ribbon at the top of the refurbished south steps to celebrate the latest phase of the church's restoration. The project also included repointing the walls of the upper tower, to eliminate leaks, and these two elements were funded by Waste Recycling Environmental Limited (WREN). We have now received that £5,000. During the opening, thanks were also given to Len Morris and Ian Livingstone for their extensive project management, while Councillor Kevin Warnes praised the whole church for making community activities welcome. At present we are waiting for work to start on the lower west window (vestry) and for quotes to restore the paint in the main vestibule. This is funded mainly by income from visitors and groups, so well done to all helping to keep the church open!

On Sunday 16th November the church meeting requested that we look as soon as possible at improving the kitchen and toilets utilising the generous legacies from Michael Fletcher and Sheila Hunter. This will be alongside our next major fund-raising campaign – an appeal for help to build adequate disabled access, appropriate to our grade 1 listed building.
